We painted pictures about our wonderful wetlands.




























We took a survey of the teachers at Ellison Elementary.

The wetlands need our help. We picked up garbage. We cheered on and helped Mr. Garlick's high school students who were in the water picking up garbage too!














The wetlands need adult help
